- **Glow-in-the-Dark (GITD) Features:** Skins that feature glowing aspects are widely prized for night-time exposure.

Popular Camouflage Sets by Biome

1. Snow Biome:

- *Top Picks:* Arctic Suit, Whiteout collection, or the Sub-Zero gear.
- *Why:* Allows gamers to blend effortlessly versus snowbanks, making ambushes easier and escapes cleaner.

2. Desert Biome:

- *Top Picks:* Desert Raiders, Sandstorm, or Nomad sets.
- *Why:* Matches the yellowish-brown terrain of deserts, breaking up gamer silhouettes successfully.
