How to Acquire Rust Skins

1. **The Steam Item Store:** Every Thursday, Facepunch launches a new batch of community-created skins chosen by the developers. Buying them directly from the shop guarantees the base price (generally between £ 0.99 and £ 2.99).
2. **The Steam Community Market:** Once skins have been purchased or dropped, players can purchase and offer them easily on the Steam Market. Costs are dictated by supply and demand, meaning uncommon or popular skins can escalate in value.
3. **Random In-Game Drops:** Simply playing on official or neighborhood servers grants random item drops over time, though these are generally lower-tier typical or unusual items.

4. **Twitch Drops:** Facepunch regularly partners with popular material developers to offer unique, time-limited skins for viewers who see taking part streams.
