### 5. Prize

A growth of the CoinFlip concept. Multiple gamers toss skins into a shared pot. The worth of each gamer's skins identifies their portion chance of winning the whole pool.

### 6. Esports Match Betting

Unlike casino-style games, this includes wagering skins or cryptocurrency on the results of professional CS2 esports competitions, such as ESL Pro League or Valve Majors.
