Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Visible wear and scratches, however the art work stays mostly undamaged.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Substantial wear, fading colors, and heavy scratching.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Incredibly worn, in some cases modifying the graphic entirely. <i>(Note: Some skins look distinctively cool in BS, called "Blackscars").</i>

StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

- **StatTrak™**: Items with this technology include an orange LED counter that tracks the variety of verified eliminates made with that particular weapon.
- **Souvenir Packages**: These are dropped during main Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors) and feature gold sticker labels representing the teams and MVP of the round.

The Rarity Tiers

Valve arranges CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which determine how regularly they drop in-game or emerge from weapon cases.

1. **Consumer Grade (White):** Common, basic drops.
2. **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly better than Consumer, common in containers.
3. **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard lower-tier case drops.
