3. The Low Multiplier Auto-Cashout

- **How it works:** Players set an automatic cash-out at a really low multiplier, such as 1.05 x to 1.10 x.
- **The Catch:** While you will win the large bulk of rounds, a single unanticipated 1.00 x crash (which happens periodically) will erase lots of little wins instantly.

Threats and Safety Precautions
