3. Stuck Windows

Painted-shut windows or windows jammed by dirt and swollen wood frames can be frustrating.

- **The Fix:** For painted windows, carefully run an utility knife along the paint seal. For wood windows swollen by humidity, avoid requiring them; instead, apply a silicone-based lube or await drier weather before preparing to plane down the edges.

Common Door Issues and How to Address Them

Doors take a beating from continuous opening, closing, slamming, and shifting foundations.

1. Sticking or Sagging Doors

A door that drags out the floor or declines to latch properly generally has loose hinges or has actually moved along with the home's structure.

- **The Fix:** Open the door and inspect the hinge screws. Tighten any loose screws. If the door still droops, changing one or more brief hinge screws with longer 3-inch screws that bite deep into the framing stud can pull the door back into positioning.

2. Damaged Door Jambs and Thresholds

- **Clear Drainage Weeps:** Ensure that the weep holes on the exterior bottom of moving windows and doors are clear of particles to avoid water from backing up inside your home.
