(Note: The chances of getting a StatTrak™ version of any product are roughly 1 in 10 for each drop classification).

As the table plainly shows, the chance of unboxing a "Gold" (knife or gloves) is just over **one-quarter of one percent**.

The Economics of Unboxing: Expectation vs. Reality

From a financial viewpoint, opening CS: GO cases is, usually, a losing proposition.
