4. **Evaluate the Door:** Tighten the screw and close the door. The longer screw will pull the hinge-- and the entire door-- tighter to the frame, lifting the sagging corner off the flooring.
5. **Repeat if Necessary:** If the door still sags, repeat the process on the middle hinge.
