Valve has actually since implemented trade holds (a 7-day waiting period for traded items) and updated its Terms of Service to explicitly forbid the commercial use of Steam accounts for gambling. In spite of these efforts, the marketplace remains active, operating through complex workarounds and cryptocurrency combinations.
